Travelers who approached Munich in the early days could clearly see why it was called "German Rome". The townscape was marked by numerous churches and monasteries which testified to the city's deep roots in the Catholic faith.

Today a wide range of buildings bear witness to other religious persuasions that are historically connected to Munich and also invite exploration.

Take this walk and experience different places of Christian and Jewish faith.

1 "Before the City Gates"

The Protestant St. Matthew's Church

- First Protestant church in Munich, 1833.
- Church of the Lutheran regional bishop.
- Rebuilt after destruction in the war; path-breaking for modern church design in Munich.
- Home of the Munich Motet Choir.



2 The Jewish Center

A new home in the heart of the city

- In 1229 the first authenticated person of Jewish faith in Munich "Abraham de Municha".
- In the 19th century, after a tumultuous history, foundation of the Jewish Community and granting of civil rights.
- As off 1945, following the end of the national socialists' reign of terror, growth and integration of the Jewish Community.
- Since 2006 heart of Jewish life with synagogue, community center and museum about the history and culture of Jewish people in Munich.



3 "Beneath Thy Protection"

The St. Mary's Column at Marienplatz square

- Ecclesiastical and secular center of Munich.
- Testimony to the faith and trust in the "Patrona Bavariae"; the patroness of Bavaria.



4 Church of Our Lady



Metropolitan Church of Our Blessed Lady

- Largest church in Munich, bishop's seat and landmark.
- Masterworks of famous artists, such as Ignaz Günther, Jan Pollack, Erasmus Grasser, Hans Krumper.
- Bears witness to the adoration of saints and the Virgin Mary through the centuries.
- Coats of arms of the archbishops, such as the coat of arms of Joseph Ratzinger, who became Pope Benedict XVI after serving as Archbishop of Munich and Freising from 1977 to 1982.

5 St. Salvador Church

Greek-Orthodox religious life in Munich

- In 1828 the former cemetery church of St. Salvador was transferred to the Greek-Orthodox community.
- Oldest Greek-Orthodox church in Germany and today seat of its largest community.
- Synthesis between western church design and Orthodox art and liturgy.
